Bringing the Gospel by Bread & Tortilla Chiapas Project Bulletin # 73, May 2024

The Chiapas Project Food Pantry is a biweekly gift of staples (beans, rice, oil, and sugar) to families facing food insecurity in the barrio of the church of San Benito de Nursia, a program that will celebrate its fourth anniversary next November. This month there were three Fridays on which groceries were distributed: May 3rd, 17th and 31st, and Fr. Florencio's photos of families picking up their food have been collected here as a montage. The Food Pantry is a joint venture between the Church of St. Benito in San Cristobal and four Chicago Episcopal churches: St. Chrysostom, Church of Our Saviour, Church of the Atonement and Church of the Holy Comforter. Our relationship falls under the umbrella of the Companionship between the Diocese of Chicago and Diocese of Southeast Mexico that began almost 25 years ago. Below are the groceries ready for distribution alternate Fridays this month.

Every two weeks, when food is distributed, Fr. Florencio sends photos of the families and their food, his way of assuring us in Chicago that every penny we send is being carefully used to provision his neighbors.







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Our Food Pantry makes it possible for San Benito de Nursia (possibly the poorest parish in the Diocese which, itself, is the least advantaged in the Provenance of Mexico) to provide food for forty-five families in their neighborhood. About ten families have removed themselves as pantry recipients as their circumstances have improved during the past three years, and new families have taken their place.

Our combined efforts in May, pictured on these three pages (about 2/3 of the recipients), probably delivered 650 meals. The cost for May's three food pantries for our four churches in Chicago was \$724 (an average of \$181/church).





April's visit revisited.

I asked our April travelers from Atonement if one of them might want to add a reflection to last month's summary of their first visit to our sister churches. Richard Benson sent the following:



I was gratified to be a part of Atonement's first visit to our sister churches in Chiapas; this trip became, as I had hoped, more of a retreat than a vacation that led me into deeper relations with my fellow parishioners and a whole new world of friendships with my brothers and sisters in Christ in our companion churches.

Most important, God revealed himself on this trip. We shared in worship in wonderful ways

in both San Cristobal and in the highlands in Yochib. I will always treasure sitting with Fr. Florencio in morning prayer, and later singing with the congregations.

At first, I felt inadequate. All I had to contribute was a gift of two prayer books, my conversational Spanish, and a singing voice. But I came to appreciate that there really <u>is</u> a ministry of *presence*. Just being with people, sharing and reciprocating their love, and doing your best to get to know them – this is a Christian virtue unto itself. And in return our friends in Chiapas showered their hospitality upon us, from meals and a soccer game to a mariachi celebration. Chiapas is a beautiful and, I think for all of us, blessed place.

Notes for future travelers: pack lightly and with good walking shoes. There are plenty of *lavanderias* to wash your clothes; you can then have more room for gifts! The Pimsleur app helped me grow my conversational Spanish skills before travel. Don't listen to people who perceive Chiapas as risky. Mexicans themselves vacation in San Cristobal. Be prepared to rest, see beauty in nature and the kindness of people, make new friends, and be transformed. I can't wait to go back. (consulte la página 11 para ver la traducción)

studies. After the reading we reflected on the stages of our little lives, and at the end they drew with watercolor and colors what they learned. When they returned to the church, they enjoyed bread with juice, and we raffled off some toys for the group.

La aplicación Pimsleur me ayudó a desarrollar mis habilidades conversacionales en español antes de viajar. No escuches a las personas que perciben a Chiapas como un lugar riesgoso. Los propios mexicanos vacacionan en San Cristóbal. Prepárate para descansar, ver la belleza en la naturaleza y la amabilidad de las personas, hacer nuevos amigos y ser transformado. No puedo esperar para volver.
